



The other significant news of the past year is that we're working hard to trim our expenses and improve our financial position while looking to do some serious promotion. Comparing actual 2018 revenues to expenses, we cut our loss from almost \$2,100 down to less than \$800. A significant part of those expenses was the several hundred dollars we spent on promotional items to make the NSDCA known in Atlanta which was significant in signing up twenty new members. We found out that much of the national square dance/camping community had never heard of the NSDCA. We intend to change that and hope to do even better in the future, both financially and with memberships with the help of Bill and Kathy Baker, our Publicity & Public Relations Directors. They have some great ideas for the future so stay tuned for a positive future for the NSDCA.

PLEASE BE SURE TO KEEP YOUR CHAPTER'S CAMPOUT SCHED-ULE UPDATED. VISITORS AND GUESTS CAN'T FIND YOU IF YOU DON'T LET THEM KNOW WHERE YOU ARE. BESIDES HERE IN THE TIMES, THIS LISTING IS ALSO POSTED ON THE NSDCA WEBSITE (NSDCA.ORG) AND IS REGULARLY UPDATED WITH EVERY NEW ISSUE OF THE TIMES.

About the E-Tree ...

First, it doesn't need watering, it's not a tree, but a communications distribution method.

As the NSDCA is an organization that is spread across the continental US, Canada and Germany, it's important that we have an ability to communicate items of importance or interest to every member of the NSDCA. That's what the E-Tree is all about. It's administered by your Communications Director, Karin Callander, and depends on the following, that:

- 1. Karin Callander has the correct and current e-mail addresses for the State and Area Representatives.
- 2. All chapters have identified a Chapter Representative. This can be the President or any member of the chapter that is willing to perform the communication task.
- State and Area Representatives have correct and current e-mail addresses for all Chapter Representatives in their areas of responsibility, preferably as an e-mail distribution list.
- 4. Chapter Representatives have correct and current e-mail addresses for all their chapter members, preferably as an e-mail distribution list
- State and Area Representatives quickly forward any E-Tree communications to all Chapter Representatives in their areas of responsibility.
- 6. All Chapter Representatives forward any E-Tree communications to all their chapter members.
- 7. All NSDCA members regularly check their e-mail, preferably daily.

If all members would participate in the E-Tree process, it's easy to see that any E-Tree notice should be able to reach every e-mail connected member within one day. We're asking that all our members help us make sure that this works. We will not give out anyone's e-mail to unauthorized users. Please help us in this process and for:

- 1. All members, please make sure that your Chapter Representative has your correct and current e-mail address.
- 2. Chapter Representatives, please make sure that your State or Area Representative has your correct and current e-mail.
- 3. State and Area Representatives, please make sure that Karin Callander has your correct and current e-mail address.

Karin is also working on implementing an alternate method using Google Groups. If you're a Google user, this may work for you. Thanks for your help.

Why Should We Belong to the NSDCA?

I've often been asked and thought about why we should belong to the NSDCA? What do I/we get for our \$20 annual fees? After all, we can camp and dance together without the NSDCA.

The short answer is <u>friendship</u>, being with friends that enjoy camping and square dancing like you do.

However, there is a longer and better answer.

It is true that the major benefit is *friendship*, but these friends are truly special because they become more like a family, and often closer than your own family. You'll of course dance with them, but when you spend a weekend or more with the same people, people you enjoy being around, people you'll laugh with, cry with, cook with, eat with and so much more, they become more than a family. They're people who in many cases will help and support you in your most trying moments, often when your own family has let you down. When is the last time that you were able to spend two whole days relaxing with your family, children, grandchildren, siblings, parents, etc., when you didn't have to cook, entertain, cut the grass, wash the car, do the laundry and so on in between a few moments of relaxing and enjoying one another? Then the extended benefit is that through the NSDCA, you can stay connected even though you may live hundreds or even thousands of miles apart.

Because of the monthly campouts and dances, you'll naturally stay connected locally, but through the NSDCA's annual national events and major state or area events, you'll stay connected with old friends. But like most things, you'll get out of the NSDCA only what you put in. In order to have friends, you must be a friend; in order to have fun, you need to contribute to that fun. That means going to the campouts and dances, going to the state events and area or national events. It's not necessary to attend them all, but if you never go or participate, you can't expect to receive in kind.

The NSDCA *Times*, which takes most of your annual \$20, gives you a voice and a resource to share your ideas and experiences with your friends across the country and allows you to stay connected through the Campouts listing section so that you can visit camping/dancing friends no matter where you go. It also allows your friends across the country to visit you since they can check on your campout schedule. True, there is the small matter of insurance. Yes, it's small because it only cost you about \$3 annually and seems to do very little for you unless you need it, or so you think. That's true as long as we're more concerned about ourselves than the NSDCA and what it can do for all members, including ourselves. Most of us already have accident or medical insurance so why

should we pay again? The truth is that the insurance includes a general liability rider for \$1,000,000 which is required to protect the NSDCA and all of us at our major events, and without it, we would not be able to book the major sites for our Camporees. The major event venues require it and your own insurance does not provide it for all of us.

For those of you who are still asking whether or not you're getting your money's worth, all I can say is that it's worth many times more than the \$20, but only if you participate and share yourself with your friends. Consider that if you just attend the annual NSDCA International Camporee, you'll save the \$20 off your registration since non-members are charged full price; that means that your membership is free if you attend that year's Camporee. Then if you travel and attend other NSDCA chapter campouts or events, most of them also offer an NSDCA member discount. If you visit Florida and attend our annual Camporee, you'll save another \$20 since NSDCA members also receive a \$20 discount. Other state Camporees do even better than that. By my calculation, the two Camporee events mentioned alone save you twice what membership cost you, and you haven't gone anywhere else yet.

The punch line is that if you want more than your money's worth, you need to participate, to have fun, to enjoy your friends, and be an active member of our national organization, the NSDCA.

Highlights of the 2019 NSDCA International Camporee

Although the Camporee didn't officially begin until Tuesday, June 18th, two free dances were held - one on Sunday for Father's Day and the other a Trails-End, on Monday. A 'Meet-and-Greet' was also held on Monday. Games, crafts, workshops and official meetings all began on Tuesday, with (of course) a continuation of the real reason you came to the Camporee: dancing and fellowship! Tuesday night's *Parade of States* showcased over 120 dancers representing 20 NSDCA Chapters from 17 different US states or Canadian provinces. The dance floor sported 15 squares and 24 couples dancing rounds. Evening afterparties were well attended.

The newly seated Board of Directors consists of: John and Dolly Ide, Presidents; Tom and Pat Herscha, Vice Presidents; Dave and Mary Bruun, Secretaries (reelected to a new four-year term by affirmation); and Tom and Kathy Nickel, Treasurers. Certificates for "New Chapters" were awarded to Chapters: 196, Wabash Valley Wheel Arounds (IN/IL) 6/30/2016; 197 Camping Squares of North Carolina (NC) 7/29/2018; and 198 Crossfire Campers (TN) 2/1/2019. "Most New Members" certificate was given also to 198 Crossfire Campers with 18 new members, with a total of 31. 

Helpful Hints for Your RV: Batteries (Part 2)

This is a continuation of the article from the Summer 2019 issue of the *Times*. That article introduced the 12-volt "house battery" system supplying your low-voltage lighting and control requirements in your RV, and discussed the types of batteries available, inspection and general battery maintenance. This issue covers testing, watering, cleaning and storage.

The following information is adapted from Trojan Battery Company's maintenance page (https://www.trojanbattery.com/tech-support/battery-maintenance/); see the website for full details. If you are not comfortable performing these kinds of actions, please defer to someone who is, such as an RV technician.

Testing

Visual inspection alone is not sufficient to determine the overall health of the battery.

Both open-circuit (unloaded) voltage and specific gravity readings can give a good indication of the battery's charge level, age, and health. Routine voltage and gravity checks will not only show the state of charge but also help spot signs of improper care, such as undercharging and overwatering, and possibly even locate a bad or weak battery cell. The following steps outline how to properly perform routine voltage and specific gravity testing on batteries.

- I. Specific Gravity Test (i.e., acid density; for flooded batteries only)
 - 1. Do not add water at this time.
 - 2. Fill and drain the hydrometer 2 to 4 times before pulling out a sample.
 - 3. There should be enough sample electrolyte in the hydrometer to completely support the float.
 - 4. Take a reading, record it, and return the electrolyte back to the cell.
 - 5. To check another cell, repeat the above steps.
 - 6. Check all cells in the battery.
 - 7. Replace the vent caps and wipe off any electrolyte that might have been spilled.
 - 8. Correct the readings to 80° F (26.6° C):
 - Add 0.004 [or subtract] to readings for every 10° F (5.6° C) above [or below] 80° F (26.6° C)
 - 9. Compare the readings.
 - 10. Check the state of charge using the Table 1 on the next page.

The readings should be at or above the factory specification of 1.277 +/-0.007. If any specific gravity readings register low, then follow the steps below.

1. Check and record voltage level(s).

- 2. Put battery(s) on a complete charge.
- 3. Take specific gravity readings again.

If any specific gravity readings still register low then follow the steps below.

- 1. Check voltage level(s).
- 2. Perform an equalization charge. Refer to the *Equalizing Section* (in the next issue) for the proper procedure.
- 3. Take specific gravity readings again.

If any specific gravity reading still registers lower than the factory specification of 1.277+/- 0.007 then one or more of the following conditions may exist:

- 1. The battery is old and approaching the end of its life.
- 2. The battery was left in a state of discharge too long.
- 3. Electrolyte was lost due to spillage or overflow.
- 4. A weak or bad cell is developing.
- 5. Battery was watered excessively previous to testing.

Batteries in conditions 1 - 4 (as identified immediately above) should be taken to a specialist for further evaluation or retired from service.

Table 1: State of Charge as Related to Specific Gravity and Open Circuit Voltage

Percentage of Charge	Specific Gravity corrected to	Open-Circuit 6V	Voltage 12V
100	1.277	6.37	12.73
90	1.258	6.31	12.62
80	1.238	6.25	12.50
70	1.217	6.19	12.37

II. Open-Circuit Voltage Test

For accurate voltage readings, batteries must remain idle (no charging, no discharging) for at least 6 hours, preferably for 24 hours.

- 1. Disconnect all loads from the batteries.
- 2. Measure the voltage using a DC voltmeter.
- 3. Check the state of charge with Table 1 above.
- 4. Charge the battery if it registers 0% to 70% charged. (Editor's note: A battery with less than 80% of its charge value as identified in Table 1 is considered fully discharged, even though its voltage is still greater than the "rated" value.)

If the battery registers less than the Table 1 values, the following conditions may exist:

1. The battery was left in a state of discharge too long.

2. The battery has a bad cell.

Batteries in these conditions should be taken to a specialist for further evaluation or retired from service.

Watering

FLOODED BATTERIES ONLY

Flooded batteries need water.

More importantly, watering must be done at the right time and in the right amount or the battery's performance and longevity suffers.

Water should always be added after fully charging the battery. Prior to charging, there should be enough water to cover the plates. If the battery has been discharged (partially or fully), the water level should also be above the plates. Keeping the water at the correct level after a full charge will prevent having to worry about the water level at a different state of charge.

Depending on the local climate, charging methods, application, etc., batteries should be checked once a month until you get a feel for how often your batteries need watering.

Important Things to Remember

- 1. Do not let the plates get exposed to air. This will damage (corrode) the plates.
- 2. Do not fill the water level in the filling well to the cap. This most likely will cause the battery to overflow acid, consequently losing capacity and causing a corrosive mess.
- 3. Do not use water with a high mineral content. Use distilled or deionized water only.

CAUTION: The electrolyte is a solution of acid and water so skin contact should be avoided. Wear your protective clothing (gloves and goggles).

Step-By-Step Watering Procedure

- 1. Open the vent caps and look inside the fill wells.
- 2. Check the electrolyte level; the minimum level is at the top of the plates.
- 3. If necessary, add just enough water to cover the plates at this time.
- 4. Put batteries through a complete charge cycle before adding any additional water (refer to the *Charging Section*, next issue).
- 5. Once charging is completed, open the vent caps and look inside the fill wells.
- 6. Add water until the electrolyte level is 1/8" below the bottom of the fill well.
- 7. A piece of rubber can be used safely as a dipstick to help determine this level.

8. Clean, replace, and tighten all vent caps.

WARNING: Never add acid to a battery.

Cleaning

Batteries seem to attract dust, dirt, and grime. Keeping them clean will help spot signs of trouble when they appear and avoid problems associated with grime.

- 1. Check that all vent caps are tightly in place.
- 2. If necessary, clean the battery top with a cloth or brush and a solution of baking soda and water.
 - When cleaning, do not allow any cleaning solution or other foreign matter to get inside the battery.
- 3. Rinse with water and dry with a clean cloth.
- 4. Clean battery terminals and the inside of cable clamps using a post and clamp cleaner.
 - Clean terminals will have a bright metallic shine.
- 5. Reconnect the clamps to the terminals and thinly coat them with an anti-corrosive spray or silicone gel.
- 6. Keep the area around batteries clean and dry.

Storage

Periods of inactivity can be extremely harmful to lead acid batteries. When placing a battery into storage, follow the recommendations below to ensure that the battery remains healthy and ready for use.

NOTE: Storing, charging or operating batteries on concrete is perfectly OK.

The Most Important Things to Avoid

- Freezing. Avoid locations where freezing temperature are expected. Keeping a battery at a high state of charge will also prevent freezing. Freezing results in irreparable damage to a battery's plates and container.
- 2. **Heat**. Avoid direct exposure to heat sources, such as radiators or space heaters. Temperatures above 80° F (26.6° C) accelerate the battery's self-discharge characteristics.

Step-By-Step Storage Procedure

- 1. Completely charge the battery before storing.
- Store the battery in a cool, dry location, protected from the elements.
- 3. During storage, monitor the specific gravity (flooded) or voltage. Batteries in storage should be given a boost charge when they show a 70% charge or less. See Table 1 in the *Testing Section* on page 45.

- 4. Completely charge the battery before placing it back in service.
- 5. For optimum performance, equalize the batteries (flooded) before putting them back into service. Refer to the *Equalizing Section* (in the next issue) for this procedure.

In the next issue we will address how to select and use a battery charger, equalizing, discharging, watering and tips for maximizing battery life.

Mediterranean Farro Salad

1 Tbsp red wine vinegar

1/3 tsp dried oregano

a pinch of garlic powder

a pinch of salt

a pinch of black pepper

Steps

- 1. Stir together stock and farro in a medium saucepan; cook according to the package instructions until *al dente*. Let farro cool for at least 10 minutes.
- 2. Transfer farro to a large mixing bowl; add in remaining ingredients (including the vinaigrette). Toss until combined.

Serve immediately, or cover and refrigerate for up to two days.


Our modifications: 2.5 cups water (in lieu of the stock); 1.25 cup quinoa (in lieu of the farro); 1/3 cup sun-dried tomatoes; 2 Tbsp lemon juice; 4 Tbsp apple cider vinegar. We also add 16 oz. of reduced-sodium garbanzo beans (chickpeas), rinsed and drained.

NOTES FROM YOUR EDITOR

NOTE: The most-current, up-to-date camping schedule is posted on the NSDCA website: nsdca.org. While I recognize that not all chapters meet every month, especially as winter approaches, those chapters that *do* report year-round are fairly consistent. I would like to encourage *everyone* to submit something to the *Times* for these two sections ("Chats" and "Campouts"), no matter how trivial you think it might be or infrequently your chapter meets.

Please be sure to identify your chapter in the subject line of the email; this makes it easier for me to sort things out when assembling the newsletter. Also include the name of the person writing the article or providing the camping schedule and contact information (email and/or phone number). Photographs should be at least 300 dpi resolution; most cell phone cameras and DSLR jpeg/jpg files should be adequate. Deadlines are listed on the inside of the front cover (page 2).


