

Social media has been evolving and changing as it gains acceptance. Many still do not use Facebook or other social media apps, but that is also changing. In particular what is changing is our recognition that it can serve to keep people informed about events they may miss without the use of some type of digital-world communication.

Of course, websites have been in existence longer than the newer digital phone applications; they are still quite informative and can be an excellent tool to announce or to search for events when you are in a new area. My favorite website for finding square dances is wheresthedance.com; I have used it many times and also post schedules for several square dance clubs in our Central Illinois area, and even some in Texas. A couple of months ago I happen to be near Pittsburgh and I found a nice dance just a couple of miles from my hotel on that site. I had a great time and was actually the 8th man—so we could dance two squares.

But besides websites, other modes of communication are gaining ground. Facebook is a major player in this field, and it has both promoters and detractors. Some people just don't want to take a look, and some are on that app all the time.

There is a Facebook group called 'Central Illinois Square Dance Clubs' that posts about dancing in our home area of the state. It is a great way to get the different dancing venues in front of people that may not know about what is going on in the area. If you are a Facebook user, go to 'groups,' click on the spy glass in the upper right corner, and type "Square Dancing," where you will see page after page of groups associated with Square Dancing.

It is fairly easy to post upcoming events, flyers and photos or video of dances and dancers on Facebook. Someone that you know can probably teach you how to find Square Dancing and maybe help you post some of your pictures as well. My advice on how to find a genuine professional is ask your grandkids!

One caution when taking video clips with your cell phone is that you need to be aware of where you are standing and what is being said around you while you are recording. Any talking will be picked up by your phone, and the words said may have a negative effect on your audience if you replay a comment that shouldn't be duplicated. It happen to me last week; someone walked by while I was recording and made a comment about another person that shouldn't have been said, much less be repeated. I stopped recording, moved to a new location and reshot a short video clip.

Please keep Square Dancing going by adding good stories, videos and photos of the great time you can have Square Dancing and camping.







Helpful Hints: The New RV Sound System and GPS - Apple CarPlay or Android Auto

As you may recall from the last issue of the *TIMES*, we recently changed from camping with a bumper-pull trailer to a Class C motorhome. Our former trailer had a 12-volt stereo system (meaning we could play music when not plugged into shore power) that had an AM/FM radio and could play music from CDs, mp3 disks or flash drives, as well as play DVD movies through our TV. The sound was reproduced from some ceiling-mounted speakers – certainly audible, but with little dynamic range (although if I really wanted, they could have been replaced with higher fidelity speakers). However, we still had our very nice JVC/Sync music system in our truck that produced excellent quality sound, in addition to providing a very nice (even if it was dated) GPS display (easily viewable by driver and passenger, even while wearing polarized sunglasses) along with integrated audio instructions.

Not so with our new motorhome! Gone from the 'house' portion of the RV is any form of a conventional radio/CD/DVD player along with its separate ceiling-mounted speakers. The manufacturer did provide a no-name DVD player that would play regular CDs but not mp3-encoded CDs or flash drives. The sound comes only through the TV, and to be polite – its speakers are extremely low quality. I ended up replacing the DVD player with a device that would play mp3s and flash drives, but still the sound comes through the TV, and the TV and DVD player only operate on 120 volts AC, so we can no longer listen to music unless we are plugged into shore power or running the generator. We also no longer have a radio to listen to when we are parked.

The cab portion of the RV also no longer has a conventional radio/CD player or navigation system; in its stead is an Apple CarPlay/Android Auto display head (hereafter just called 'CarPlay'). For those unfamiliar with the term, a CarPlay device extends your smart phone's capabilities for GPS navigation and playing music to that device, where you can view the GPS map in a larger screen and hear the audio through supposedly better speakers. It also serves as a Bluetooth phone, allowing you to make and receive phone calls through your phone, but handled through the CarPlay device (like what happens in your car, if so enabled). This seems to be the trend these days: little to no audio capability in the living quarters, and a CarPlay unit in the motorhome's cab or in the tow vehicle. Our unit is identified as a Chameleon Concept XL-10, which looks very nice on paper but falls short on execution.

The unit is a roughly 10-inch diagonal display LED panel, something like what you'd get on a computer, that protrudes from the location where the radio would normally be. The panel is fixed in its orientation and does not swivel for ease of viewing by either the driver or passenger,

although it is advertised as being able to do so. The screen is shiny versus with a matte, non-reflective finish, and if I am wearing my clip-on polarized sunglasses the information that is displayed on the panel is almost invisible. The unit's power switch is nothing of the sort; it simply kills the audio but leaves everything else operating. The only way to turn the unit off is to turn off the motorhome's engine, and the only way to turn the unit on is to place the RV's key to the "ON" position (just before you turn the key fully to the "START" position); the unit does not power up when the key is in the "ACCESSORY" position as one would normally expect. This problem, I will admit, is an issue with the way the manufacturer set the unit up, and I have yet to figure out how to trace the power wire so I can move it to an appropriate spot on the fuse block.

Other issues I have with this unit are as follows:

- If using the Chameleon CarPlay device for navigation (which, by the way, only works if you have your phone paired to the unit, it has no built-in navigation capabilities in this respect) you cannot use a separate source for music, such as a flash drive. Your only choices are to use the radio (which does not have very good sensitivity, meaning it doesn't pull in stations very well) or put music onto or attempt to stream music through your phone.
- There is no way to independently control the sound level of the music and the audio instructions coming from the GPS function of your phone. We have found it necessary to have the music playing louder than we would like so we can hear the instructions from the GPS. The system does silence the music when instructions are given, but I suspect this is really controlled by the phone and not the Chameleon device.
- There is no way to silence the radio without affecting your ability to hear the GPS instructions. As previously mentioned, the power button really controls the audio level: on or off. But if the audio is off then you can't hear the GPS instructions, and I have found there is no way to silence the radio unless you bring up the music app on your phone and then pause it.
- When streaming music from a website (versus using the music app and playing songs stored on your phone) the system regularly hangs and refuses to play any more music. The only way we've found to remedy this situation is to restart the process at the phone, something that can only safely be done by the passenger while you are driving.
- Initially, when we first bought the RV, the side and rear-view cameras were displaying through the CarPlay device. When you flipped your directional on to indicate a lane change or a turn, the appropriate side-view camera would display on the screen. However, when that occurred it supplanted any navigation map that was displayed and

killed the audio, so not only couldn't you see where you were to go, you couldn't even hear instructions that might have been given while your directional was still on (e.g., plan for an immediate left turn after exiting the interstate). The navigation and audio did not return for several seconds after the directional had clicked off, leading to a significant amount of time you were perhaps 'driving blind.' This situation was remedied at the factory for us by removing the cameras from displaying on the CarPlay device and moving the display to a monitor that was mounted in place of the rear-view mirror.

These problems denoted above may be attributable to the implementation of this particular brand, or they could be endemic to all CarPlay devices; I do not know, as I don't have experience with any other brand of CarPlay device. I'll say this: the concept is wonderful, but the implementation by this particular manufacturer leaves a lot to be desired.

As this appears to be the future for supplied navigation and audio systems, I would greatly appreciate any feedback users of other brands of CarPlay devices have, positive and negative. Please be sure to include the manufacturer and model number of the device you are commenting on. I will attempt to summarize those comments in a future issue of the *TIMES*. You may not be able to get the dealership to change out a poorly designed CarPlay unit when you get a new tow vehicle or motorhome, but at least you'll know some of the challenges you will face in its use.

How Clubs can use Facebook to their Advantage

Here are some details on why and how Facebook is useful as a recruiting tool. Let me start by explaining that after I finished writing a letter on the use of Facebook versus newspaper advertising to our NSDC State Regional Association, the North East Florida Square and Round Dance Association (NEFSARDA), my wife – who was looking over my shoulder – grabbed the keyboard and proceeded to write about the number of squares and the growth that we experienced in the club I call for. I said to her, "Deborah, that looks like we're bragging!" and she replied, "No, we just need to let people know they need to start using modern methods to recruit dancers."

In today's world, Facebook is the way many people meet up, find things to do, and much more. In the United States, 175 million Americans have Facebook accounts out of a population of 355 million; that's almost 50% of the US population. It's not the only social media platform available, but is certainly one of the best-known. The awesome thing about it is that it's free. It's free to have an account and it's free to set up a page as we did for our square dance club. Our Facebook page gives us a place to keep our regular dancers informed and enthused about the club, and it gives us a great place to show new prospects what we do and how much fun we have.

At this time, we currently have about 120 members and a typical posting to our Facebook page will receive about 65 views. That means 65 people have clicked on our page to see what's going on. Some of them are active participants at our Thursday night club dances, and some of the people are friends of the club.

Some of you might point out that your club has a Facebook page. That may be true, but is your page active? How many dancers in your club have joined your Facebook group? How often do you post to your group and how many views do you get? This leads to the question of how do you establish a Facebook group for your club with active participation by your members and others.

It starts by encouraging your regular dancers to join your club's Facebook group. They should also be encouraged to take photographs and post them. The Facebook group will have an administrator and should have at least one moderator that is a trusted member of your club. Someone in the club, be it a regular member or a Board member, should make a habit of regularly posting to the Facebook group. The posting should be at least as frequently as the club meets. This keeps the group at the top of the feed list. The other key to having an active Facebook group is to include a link to your Facebook page in every piece of advertising that you use. A good example of this is our main club flyer. A QR code in the lower left corner goes straight to our Facebook page. We include a QR code

on all flyers and handouts and everywhere else we can possibly use it. It has been especially useful with our recent flyer to recruit students for a class. A contact name and a phone number are included on the flyer, but most people contacted us *after* first viewing our Facebook page. It is so easy for prospective dancers to scan a QR code and look and see what's going on before making any commitment. Some of the people who ultimately showed up for our class contacted us via phone to verify the details. We had a few that showed up just based on the flyer and the Facebook page.

Many clubs will have a webpage. That is also a good thing, but oftentimes they are not kept up-to-date. If you search the Internet, it seems like many of them have photographs that are a few years old, schedules that are not current, and contacts that no longer exist. If your club is one of the ones that does have an up-to-date webpage, an A+ for you. It is definitely a good thing and will help your group. However, a webpage is very limited in comparison to what a Facebook group offers. With a webpage, the webmaster has to make changes and the process can differ depending on what host server is used. This creates a situation where perhaps only one or two people can provide content, but with Facebook, on the other hand, anybody that has joined and been approved by the moderator can post content. This will result in a very rich and varied amount of content that keeps people returning to see what's happening with your club. People especially love to see photographs. They like seeing their friends dancing, and quite frankly they like to see themselves in that dance.

With a Facebook page, you can easily keep the group informed about upcoming events such as special themes for a particular dance night or road trips to other clubs or trips to a big dance somewhere. And on and on. It's just a matter of letting the creativity flow. The more you create Facebook content the easier it gets and your club will benefit as a result.

Broccoli Salad

Ingredients:

- 5-6 cups broccoli florets (about 2 ½ heads of broccoli, or 450g)
- 1 cup sharp cheddar cheese, thicker, not finely shredded (115g)
- ²/₃ cup dried cranberries (85g)
- ½ cup crumbled bacon (60g)
- ½ cup salted sunflower seeds (60g)
- ¹/₃ cup red onion diced into small pieces (50g)

Dressing:

- ³/₄ cup mayo (I suggest olive oil mayonnaise)
- ½ cup sour cream
- 1 ½ Tablespoon white wine vinegar
- 3 Tablespoons sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon pepper

Steps:

- Combine broccoli florets, cheddar cheese, dried cranberries, bacon, sunflower seeds and onion in a large bowl.
- 2) In a separate, small bowl, whisk together the mayonaisse, sour cream, vinegar, sugar, salt and pepper until smooth and well-combined.
- 3) Pour dressing over broccoli combination and toss or stir well.
- The broccoli salad may be served immediately, but for best flavor refrigerate for at least one hour before serving. Make sure to toss the broccoli salad thoroughly again before serving.
- 5) Keep refrigerated if not consuming right away.

Makes about 8 1-cup servings: ~190 calories/serving

As of the writing of this column, Spring has sprung, and by the time the printed issue of this newsletter hits your mailboxes, Summer will be right around the corner. Along with the rebirth of plant foliage (including the need to may our lawns). I was intending


(including the need to mow our lawns) I was intending for your newsletter to get a little facelift in this issue. This change is being prompted by a change in computer platforms and the associated software used to produce this document. For the last umpteen years, Microsoft Publisher has been the program of record which has been used to assemble the *TIMES*. With the impending departure of my Windows PC (due to natural causes: age), I have opted to (as some PC users would say) go over to the 'dark side' and am now using an Intel-based Apple Macintosh. As *Publisher* is available only for Windows-based platforms, I needed to find a way to run Publisher on the Mac (using a Windows emulator or running in dualboot mode) or find a new software package to produce the newsletter. After considerable research into emulators and discovering that *Publisher* does not reliably work under them (if at all) and then deciding not to dedicate a large chunk of my limited internal storage drive to Windows (computer gurus, please note that I am more than willing to run Windows from an external drive, but I have yet to figure out how to do this. If you know, please enlighten me!) I have opted to attempt to use the Scribus desktop publishing program (akin to professional programs such as QuarkXPress or InDesign) to produce the TIMES. Scribus is extremely powerful and thus quite complicated in its use, and has a steep learning curve. It is going to take quite a while for me to fully come up to speed with all its features and become comfortable using it, assuming I succeed at all. However, while exploring Scribus I also looked for comparable features in Publisher, and I did find a few. As such, you will notice small changes in this issue, and when the PC finally meets its silicon maker and I transition to Scribus, I will incorporate the available features of that program as I discover them and figure out how to use them (assuming I have not figured out how to boot Windows from an external drive). I request your patience during this transition, which I envision will cover several issues-worth of newsletters.

As you will have hopefully noted above, I called out that this is *your* newsletter. The principal contributors to the *TIMES* are the NSDCA Board and Staff – and most importantly – your Chapter Correspondents, who fill us in on what's going on at the grassroots level of our organization; they are the backbone of this newsletter. Please remember that all members are welcomed (and encouraged) to provide content either directly (by writing an article or column) or indirectly (by suggesting an idea to be included in the newsletter). It seems the only feedback received from the general membership deals with the *Lost Camper Contest*, and even

with that communication it seems to be the same people (principally from one Chapter – hint, hint!) who submit their entries issue after issue, intent on wining a year's membership by identifying where the lost camper (or in the case of recent issues – our lost bovine) is located. There are little to no new entries from those that have not tried their hand at winning, and remember – you can't win if you don't enter.

In the same vein of contributions, I also implore you to think about what you could offer to do for the national organization. We will have a vacancy on the national Board of Directors open up in July with the retirement of our current Secretary, Ruth and Chuck "Ozzie" Osborn, and need to have that position filled for our organization to remain viable and smoothly functioning. We also need local Chapters and/or state organizations to step up and volunteer to host upcoming International Camporees. As shown by the 2023 Camporee hosted by Chapter 198 of Tennessee, a small group can handle the logistics of staging a memorable and fun event for the attendees. So, please, get involved! Contact a national Board member to find out more.

Lastly, when communicating with me (at NSDCAtimes@gmail.com) please be sure to include your Chapter number along with your name. Sometimes I receive an email that is sent from a phone and it arrives without a name or Chapter number, and I am at a loss as to who is trying to contact me. I try to acknowledge receipt of your email within a day or two, so if you don't hear anything back from me, double check the email address you sent it to, and try again. Thanks!


